Budget Season & Other Important Updates

Happy & healthy New Year! Unfortunately, we started 2023 in the red level for community spread (per the CDC's tool to identify COVID-19 in New Haven County). I ask you all to use precautions when gathering with others, and with good practices, we will keep each other safe and lower the spread of illness.

Now that we are in our budget preparation season, I once again remind everyone that education expenses account for approximately two-thirds of the operating budget. Our annual budget reflects our shared values and is a balancing act of our commitments to provide excellent education for our children and to show our respect to taxpayers by carefully budgeting for responsible spending on services. As the school districts' budgets continue to increase without a corresponding increase to the Town's grand list, which can only come from additional commercial or residential property growth, the Town may be forced to reduce services and/or raise taxes.

It remains up to the Boards of Finance and Selectmen to make these hard choices. Costs continue to escalate, and I expect this will be another tough budget year.

Please remember that **all residents** have a voice **throughout** the budget process. Operating Budget presentations to the Boards of Finance and Selectmen began in late January. Residents are encouraged to ask any budget questions, or make suggestions to boards and commissions, or department heads throughout the four-month process. Budget meetings can be viewed on Channel 79 and the WGATV79 YouTube link on the Home Page of the Town website, woodbridgect.org.

The Town's Ad Hoc 2030 Task Force is focused on finding ways to grow the Grand List in the business district. This group of business owners and town leaders is charged with taking a "big picture look" at the changes the Town should



consider in order to have a more robust and diverse grand list by 2030. Working with planning consultants, they are identifying goals for the area, and next steps based on those recommendations. They are exploring ways to lower taxes and make Woodbridge more attractive to new businesses as well as helping current businesses grow and succeed. I will keep you informed of their recommendations as they move forward.

Town residents are encouraged to 'think twice before they throw.' That is because Woodbridge, like many Connecticut towns, faces steadily rising disposal costs. To combat this trend, the Town installed a scale at the Transfer Station to accurately assess the weight and fees to be collected from commercial haulers. The scale is also used to determine and charge a standardized per pound rate for residents disposing of bulky trash items such as furniture or demolition materials.

Additionally, *Single Stream* recycling has become problematic as placing all materials into a single bin can increase the likelihood of contamination with broken glass and other undesirable and incompatible waste material into the recycling bin. The Town has a separate glass recycling container for residents and haulers alike to recycle glass appropriately and effectively.

All glass must be clean with lids removed prior to recycling. Any glass or other containers that are contaminated with food cannot be recycled; these contaminated items must be disposed of with regular trash. Unacceptable items will contaminate the entire load and will either be rejected or cost the town in contamination fees.

Important Notice from the Registrars of Voters

The Woodbridge Registrars of Voters is conducting the annual canvass of voters. Under CT State Law (CGS 9-32), the Registrars of Voters are required to conduct an annual canvass of voters between January 1 and May 1.

The purpose of this canvass is to identify voters who have moved out of Woodbridge, but have not notified the Registrars of their change in residence. Letters based on several sources of data will be mailed. First, the Registrars receive a list of address changes from the US Post Office. We also receive information from the Electronic Registration Information Center (ERIC) identifying people who have registered

in other states. ERIC is a non-profit compact of 32 states plus the District of Columbia, who have agreed to share voter data for the purpose of maintaining the integrity of voting lists. Finally, a list of voters who have not voted in the past four years is compiled. Anyone who appears on these lists will receive a Confirmation of Voting Residence Letter (CVR). **It is very important that you read and respond to this letter** if you are still a resident of Woodbridge. If a response is not received within 30 days, you will automatically be moved to inactive voting status.

Board of Assessment Appeals Notice

The Board of Assessment Appeals of the Town of Woodbridge will be holding their annual appeal meetings on:

- Thu., March 23, 6-9 pm
- Fri., March 24, 6-9 pm
- Sat., March 25, 9 am - noon

Meetings will be held to hear appeals relating to assessments for Real Property and Business Personal Property on the October 1, 2022 Grand List.

Written applications are mandatory, no appeal will be heard without one. Applications and instructions are located on the Board of Assessment Appeals page on the Town website at woodbridgect.org. Original applications must be filled out and returned to the Assessor's office **no later than 4:30 pm on February 17, 2023**. All persons

filing proper applications shall be notified by March 1 of the day, time, and information relating to their appeal hearing.

You or a duly preauthorized representative must appear. (Written authorization and the representative's personal identification must be provided prior to the hearing.) If appealing the assessed value of your property, you must present documents with application as evidence in support of your claim or an appraiser's analysis of your property value based on 2019 (the revaluation year) comparable sales. **Comparable sales are those of similar style, size and location and must be from the year 2019.**

Tax Relief Program

Woodbridge residents may file applications for the State and Town Elderly and Totally Disabled Tax Relief Programs by May 15, 2023 with the Town Assessor.

Residents eligible for State and Town tax relief programs include individuals who:

1. turned age 65 on or before Dec. 31, 2022; individuals on Social Security Disability are exempt from this age requirement.
2. hold full time residence in Woodbridge.
3. meet the State program income limits of \$40,300 maximum for singles and \$49,100 maximum for married couples.
4. meet the Town program income limits (for single or married) of \$49,100 maximum to qualify for a \$1,400 Tier 1 credit and \$83,470 maximum for a \$1,120 Tier 2 credit.

Proof of 2022 income and Social Security earnings are

required.

Tax relief is also available for veterans through a local veteran exemption offered through the Town. There is no age requirement and applications must be filed by May 15, 2023.

To qualify, honorable discharge papers (DD-214) must have been filed with the Town Clerk's office by Sept. 30, 2022. The maximum income for this program is \$65,300 for a single person or \$74,100 for a married couple.

Applications for all programs will be mailed to residents who are presently on a program and need to refile.

Applications may be filed with the office of the Assessor at Town Hall (11 Meetinghouse Lane), Mon. through Fri. between 8:30 am - 4:30 pm.
